Why the Central Virginia VA Health Care System?

The Central Virginia VA Health Care System (CVHCS) is a Level 1A health care facility offering primary, secondary and tertiary diagnostic and therapeutic health services through one main hospital in Richmond and five community-based outpatient clinics located across Central Virginia – Charlottesville, Emporia, Fredericksburg, Henrico and Spotsylvania County.

During 2020 and into 2021, CVHCS has provided lifesaving care for Veterans during the COVID-19 pandemic. In partnership with local, state and federal agencies, CVHCS has led the way for Veteran and staff care, from screening to testing and full ICU care to vaccinations. Our team continues to address the challenges our communities face during this unprecedented public health crisis, especially important as part of the nation's largest, most expansive vaccination effort in history.

CVHCS's catchment area comprises more than 22,000 square miles and 52 cities and counties in Central Virginia and a small section of northern North Carolina. More than 200,000 Veterans are estimated to live in this diverse, scenic and historic area. Members of our team, many of them Veterans, contribute each day to the communities of Central Virginia just by showing up to work.

CVHCS provides world-class, cutting-edge health care for thousands of Veterans across Central Virginia and parts of North Carolina. CVHCS has a long and storied history in Richmond. Clinic staff in Richmond, Fredericksburg, Charlottesville and Emporia have been vaccinating Veterans since initiating the COVID-19 vaccine clinics in January of this year. To this point, CVHCS vaccine clinic staff have provided more than 24,600 doses of the lifesaving vaccine for Veterans, employees, volunteers and caregivers. CVHCS began its response to the COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020.

Richard Legree is a vital team member of the COVID-19 vaccine clinic at the Central Virginia VA Health Care System’s (CVHCS) Richmond campus. The two dozen individual vaccination booths, where nurses inoculate grateful Veterans from each branch of the U.S. military, are thoroughly cleaned and sanitized after each appointment. With as high as nearly 800 appointments each day, that’s a lot of chairs to sanitize. Legree joined CVHCS in December and has been working inside the clinic ever since.
